Dumebi: A Sound, A Statement, A Soul Unfolding

From her honest lyrics to her bold personal style, Dumebi is a young artist turning emotion into art — and making space for others to feel seen along the way.

Dumebi is a young indie rock-pop artist with a sound that's completely her own. Her music is emotional, personal, and unique — and that's exactly what makes it so powerful. She's been singing for as long as she can remember, she had wrote her first song at 12, and had started seriously focusing on songwriting at 14. At 18, she dropped her debut track, "mama's boy", a moment she says felt like the beginning of her music journey. When asked what inspires her songwriting, Dumebi shared, "I write from my own experiences and emotions. I think the best art comes from being real and honest, and that's what I try to do in every song." Her upcoming single "Skinny" (dropping May 16th!) dives into body image and self-identity. "I hope it reminds listeners that they're worthy and enough, even when things aren't perfect." Her creative process for the song was all about trusting the moment — writing what felt right without forcing it. Dumebi's biggest advice to other young creators? "Stay true to yourself and never give up on your dreams. If you have a vision, chase it with everything you've got because that dream is meant for you." next.



Exploring the creativity that shapes her sound, one bold stroke at a time.





Recently, she's been loving Chappell Roan's synthy style and mixing that pop with the emo energy of MCR and Pierce the Veil.

Her songwriting is blending raw emotion deeply intuitive. "Most of my songs hit me like a random epiphany" she says. While editing lyrics takes more time, she always has a journal close when recording to help map things out. She teased that she's "definitely dropping something soon" but we'll just have to wait and see she explained through her journey she's faced racism and misogyny, but her love for music and connecting with others keeps her going.

"I'm not making music for money or fame. I want people to feel seen" she says. Favorite lyric? "I'll be with lilies in my cold hands, I'm lost in the wind, it's happening again, down by the lily pond." And that's Trinity —true, fearless, and full of heart.

Something we've noticed about Trinity is her makeup —it's not just a beauty statement, it's a story. 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





Soft Voice, Brave Heart

How roseli Turned Self-Doubt into Sound —and Found Her Power in the Process

roseli is one of those artists who feels familiar in the best way—like a character you once looked up to but somehow know in real life. She grew up watching icons like Hannah Montana and Mitchie Torres from Camp Rock, and somewhere between childhood daydreams and classroom song projects, a passion for music quietly rooted itself. But it wasn't until she was 18—navigating the heavy weight of self-doubt, that she really turned to songwriting. "I had this feeling in my chest and I just couldn't deal with it anymore," she said. That emotion turned into her first song, split ends, and with it roseli discovered just how healing creating music could be. For her, music isn't about fame or image—it's about release, growth, and feeling understood.



roseli's songwriting process starts off simple but open—she hums melodies and lets her voice guide the shape of the song before she ever touches an instrument. "I feel less constrained that way," she says. "The direction of the song can go anywhere and it feels limitless." Her guitar steps in next, helping finalize lyrics and structure. That openness —allowing the emotion to lead instead of the structure makes her music feel real, like reading someone's diary to a melody. But being a young artist isn't always easy. She's faced self-doubt and second guessing more times than she can count. Yet Roseli doesn't let that stop her anymore. Her advice: "Don't overthink it, just do it." Whether it's music or something else, she believes in going for what you love—because chances missed are far worse than imperfect tries.





roseli's music isn't just about sound—it's about growth. After years of second-guessing herself, she's learned that no one gets it right all the time, and that's never been the point. She's proof that chasing something, even when you're unsure, can lead to healing. With song speculation within the next year honeymoon, and indie girl in the future, it's clear that roseli isn't slowing down anytime soon. But more than anything, she hopes her story encourages others to just start. "You grow with every attempt," she says. "And you never know what's going to happen unless you try." Whether it's writing a song, chasing a dream, or simply being seen, Roseli's message stays the same: go for it—with your whole heart.
